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

NEW DELHI, (IANS) The postponement of several tournaments -- Ranji Trophy, Col CK Nayudu Trophy, and senior women's T20 League for the 2021/22 season due to raging COVID-19, has put a question mark on the future and livelihood of hundreds of domestic Indian cricketers who are already suffering financially since the pandemic began. The Ranji Trophy was supposed to be held for the first time in two seasons, following its cancellation for the first time in its 85-year history in 2020/21 also due to the pandemic. The men's domestic first-class competition was scheduled to start on January 13 at multiple venues across six cities -- Mumbai, Bengaluru, Kolkata, Ahmedabad, Thiruvananthapuram and Chennai.

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

MUMBAI, (IANS) Actress Vaani Kapoor, who will be next seen in 'Shamshera', says she never chooses films thinking that she would win awards for them, but picks them from her heart. Vaani says: "I have never chosen films thinking I will win awards for them. OMICRON SHADOW OVER GRAMMYS: SHOW POSTPONED

LOS ANGELES, (IANS) The Grammy Awards have been postponed due to coronavirus-related concerns, an Academy spokesperson has confirmed to 'Variety'. No new date has been confirmed as of yet.

The 2022 show, scheduled for January 31, had been moving full speed ahead before a full audience at its traditional venue, the Crypto.com Arena (formerly known as the Staples Center) in downtown Los Angeles, but the recent Covid-19 surge has caused the postponement or cancellation of multiple events across the country.

Sources have told 'Variety' that even though the Crypto.com Arena has a basketball or hockey game or a concert booked nearly every night until mid-April, a number of artistes and executives are said to have reservations about appearing in person. This is what has led to the postponement of the music world's most important show. The Recording Academy and its television partner, CBS, said in a joint statement: "Given the uncertainty surrounding the Omicron variant, holding the show on January 31 simply contains too many risks. We look forward to celebrating Music's Biggest Night on a future date, which will be announced soon."

Dharmendra unveils 2022 Dadasaheb Phalke film fest and awards

MUMBAI, (IANS) Veteran Bollywood star and former MP Dharmendra took to his Instagram handle on Thursday to share the reel unveiling the invitation to the Dadasaheb Phalke International Film Festival Awards 2022.

In his caption, Dharmendra wrote: "Friends, with love to you all, I'm delighted to unveil the mesmerising invitation to India's most prestigious awards ceremony, Dadasaheb Phalke International Film Festival Awards 2022, in affiliation with !ncredible India and Zee5." Outlining the history and relevance of the event, which will be held in Mumbai on February 20, Dharmendra said the Dadasaheb Phalke International Film Festival (DPIFF) was first held in 2012 and had been "applauded" by the Prime Minister's Office and the ministries of Culture and Tourism.

He pointed out that the festival and awards carry forward the legacy of Dhundiraj Govind Phalke, "lovingly known as Dadasaheb Phalke, the Father of Indian Cinema". He concluded by claiming that it was India's "only independent international film festival, with a mission to celebrate three broad segments of cinema and the work of aspiring, young, independent and professional filmmakers". The event will be streamed live on ZEE5 on February 20 from 7 p.m. onwards.



2022 Sundance Film Festival will be a virtual event because of Omicron

LOS ANGELES, (IANS) The Sundance Film Festival, scheduled to take place at Park City, Utah, from January 20 to 30, has scrapped its plans for an in-person gathering for 2022. It will now be presented as an exclusively virtual event because of the Omicron surge. "Despite the most ambitious protocols, the Omicron variant with its unexpectedly high transmissibility rates is pushing the limits of health safety, travel and other infrastructures across the country," 'Variety' quoted from a statement issued by the organisers. The statement noted: "The festival's in-person Utah elements will be moving online this year. While we're disappointed to not provide the full hybrid experience and gather in-person as intended, audiences this year will still experience the magic and energy of our festival." Sundance had held a virtual edition in 2021 and offered select physical screenings in markets across the US. This year, according to 'Variety', Sundance organisers were hopeful that the festival could proceed in person, given that movie theatres across the United States have not yet closed because of the Omicron variant -- and 'Spider-Man: No Way Home' continues to drive the public to the cineplex in record pandemic numbers.

Anushka Sharma-starrer 'Chakda Xpress' on Jhulan Goswami to release on Netflix

MUMBAI, (IANS) Bollywood actress Anushka Sharma is all set to make her comeback after three years with the film 'Chakda Xpress' based on the life of female Indian cricketer Jhulan Goswami. The movie will have an OTT release on Netflix.

Anushka calls 'Chakda Xpress' a really special film because it "is essentially a story of tremendous sacrifice."

"Chakda Xpress is inspired by the life and times of former Indian captain JhulanGoswami and it will be an eye-opener into the world of women's cricket. At a time when Jhulan decided to become a cricketer and make her country proud on the global stage, it was very tough for women to even think of playing the sport," she said.

Anushka shared that the film is a dramatic retelling of several instances that shaped her life and also women's cricket.

"From support systems, to facilities, to having a stable income from playing the game, to even having a future in cricket - very little propelled women of India to take up cricket as a profession. Jhulan had a fighting and extremely uncertain cricketing career and she stayed motivated to make her country proud. She strived to change the stereotype that women can't make a career out of playing cricket in India so that the next generation of girls had a better playing field."

Anushka added that Jhulan's life is a living testimony that passion and perseverance triumphs over any or all adversities and 'Chakda Xpress' is the most definitive look into the not so rosy world of women's cricket back then.

"As a woman, I was proud to hear Jhulan's story and it is an honour for me to try and bring her life to audiences and cricket lovers. As a cricketing nation, we have to give our women cricketers their due."

JIMMY SHEIRGILL PUTS RUMOURS ABOUT HIS TELEVISION DEBUT TO REST



MUMBAI, (IANS) Actor Jimmy Sheirgillopens up about the reports going around about his television debut and says it is too early to reveal anything as nothing has been finalised from his end. As per sources, 'Udaariyaan' producers, Sargun Mehta and Ravi Dubey are all set to come up with a new show, titled 'Swaran Mandir', which is going to be a family drama. 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SA V IND: WHY INDIA LOST THE JOHANNESBURG TEST

NEW DELHI, (IANS) After registering their first Test win at Centurion, India went to play the second Test at Johannesburg, a place where the tourists hadn't ever lost a match in the longest format, winning twice and drawing thrice. But within four days, South Africa handed them a seven-wicket loss, their first-ever defeat at the Wanderers. We explore the reasons where India lost the plot at Johannesburg ahead of the decider at Cape Town from January 11:

1. Batting collapses (especially in the first innings)

"I don't want to be harsh but I think batters should have scored more in the first innings after winning the toss." Stand-in captain KL Rahul's words in the post-match presentation ceremony summed up one of the biggest reasons where India faltered in Johannesburg.

In the first Test, India had the cushion of a 117-run opening stand between KL Rahul and Mayank Agarwal to post 327 despite the middle order not coming to the party. But in the second Test, Rahul, Agarwal, Pujara and Rahane fell quickly, reducing India to 91/4 at one stage. It took a fighting 46 from Ravichandran Ashwin for India to cross 200. In the second innings, though Pujara and Rahane along with Shardul Thakur and HanumaVihari starred to post 266, the damage from the first innings eventually proved to be costly.

2. Pant's brain-fade in the second innings

Rishabh Pant is someone who has the ability to turn around the game in a jiffy. On his good days, he can make the difference and on his bad days, well, he becomes the point of difference. In the second innings, after CheteshwarPujara and Ajinkya Rahane were dismissed, especially with the duo scoring half-centuries, Pant's role was to carry the good work forward.

But Kagiso Rabada had other ideas. After being beaten outside the offstump, Rabada rattled Pant with a snorter of a delivery, hitting him on the gloves after sneaking past his helmet grille. On the very next ball, Pant came dancing down the pitch to slog a short ball from Rabada but gave a feather edge behind to keeper Kyle Verreynne.

3. Not making it big

KL Rahul was the prime example of making it big and playing a huge role in India winning the first Test with 123 in the first innings. In the second Test, Rahul reached half-century but got out at the half-way mark. In contrast, Dean Elgar, the South Africa captain, was rock-solid and battled hard to hang around to ensure victory for his team.

Getting a start and not making it big costed India a lot.

It was something which Dravid had pointed out in the virtual press conference. "Maybe some of the guys who got starts could have converted into hundreds and that was the difference in the first Test as we had Rahul in the first game, who had got a hundred for us and we ended up on the winning side. And in the second game, they had someone (Elgar) scoring 96 and they ended up on the winning side."

4. Lack of big partnerships

After day one of the first Test, opener Mayank Agarwal had said that knitting partnerships and making them bigger was a highlight. But in the second Test, India had some big partnerships but did not come at a consistent rate. Sample this: India's best three partnerships in the first innings were 42, 40 and 36 while South Africa's best three partnerships in the first essay were 74, 60 and 38. In the second innings, barring the 111-run stand between Pujara and Rahane, India didn't have a half-century association to back it up. South Africa, while chasing 240, strung partnerships of 47, 46, 84 and 68 not out to win the match.

5. Siraj injury

When one of the four wheels of a car gets punctured, then it affects the movement of the vehicle. Same thing happened with India's bowling attack when Mohammed Siraj suffered a right hamstring strain on day one of the Johannesburg Test. Though Siraj came back to bowl on day two, he was operating at way below his optimum levels. In the second innings, Siraj bowled just six overs. Before being injured, Siraj had posed tough questions to Elgar. Not being at his fittest best left India wondering what a fully fit Siraj could have done.

6. Missing Kohli the captain

Perhaps, not having the services of Kohli the captain did hurt India. With Kohli being ruled out before the start of second Test, KL Rahul didn't have much time to think of plans as the stand-in skipper. Kohli was a fiery captain and used to inspire the team to do well on the field, which had an effect on tight victories in Johannesburg 2018 and Lord's 2021. But with no Kohli here, India missed his in-your-face attitude and ability to fire up things with his intensity. In the second innings, Rahul brought in Thakur, someone who could swing the ball, nine overs late. There, India missed a trick as the swing bowler could have made use of moisture on pitch and overcast conditions. His field placings left a lot to be desired as South Africa picked up runs easily.

'DON'T THINK I HAVE ANYTHING TO PROVE': VIRAT KOHLI OPENS UP ON HIS BARREN SPELL

Team India skipper Virat Kohli addressed the pre-match press conference on Monday, ahead of the all-important series decider versus South Africa. Kohli touched up upon various issues and he also addressed guestions regarding his personal form and fitness.

The 33-year-old last scored an international century against Bangladesh in 2019, however, he stated that he is not bothered about the 'outside noise', instead he's focusing on sticking to the basics, and eventually all will fall right.

"This is not the first time that people have talked about my form, it has happened a few times in my career. England in 2014 was one of those phases. I do not kind of look at myself from the lens the outside world looks at me with," said Kohli addressing the virtual press conference. The Delhi-born cricketer added he does not judge himself according to numbers, because then a person will never be content. He said, "If all the times you look at yourself and judge yourself on the basis of numbers, I do not think you will ever be content with what you are doing." Kohli also stated that he doesn't think he has anything to prove to anyone, but that being said, he still hopes to have an impact in the upcoming games. "I have nothing else to worry about but the reality of the situation is that you want to have an impact on the side. I do not think I have anything to prove to anyone," he said.

HARBHAJAN SINGH SUGGESTS UNIQUE 'SPIN' STRATEGY FOR INDIA TO WIN SERIES IN CAPE TOWN

Former Indian spinner Harbhajan Singh who recently announced his retirement from all formats of cricket has suggested that Team India should play the series decider against South Africa with two spinners. In the past two matches, India played with five bowlers, but only Ravichandran Ashwin was the registered spinner in the team.

Mohammed Shami, Jasprit Bumrah, Mohammed Siraj and Shardul Thakur were all pacers and Harbhajan feels playing two spinners might just be the x-factor that could help India defeat the Proteas and thereby win the series. So far, spinners of both sets of teams haven't had much success on South African tracks, Ravichandran Ashwin picked up just 1 solitary wicket in the second Test, while Proteas pacer Keshav Maharaj didn't register a single scalp in the ongoing Test series. Harbhajan Singh however feels the story could be a little different in the third Test. Speaking on his youtube channel, the 'Turbanator' revealed how the pitch in Cape Town is different from the previous two pitches at Centurion and Johannesburg.

MOHAMMED SHAMI ON THE CUSP OF JOINING ANIL KUMBLE, HARBHAJAN, ASHWIN IN ELITE LIST

Indian pacer Mohammed Shami, who recently completed 200 Test wickets of his career is nearing yet another personal milestone. Shami, who alongside Jasprit Bumrah wreaked havoc in the first Test, became the 11th Indian bowler to surpass the mark of 200 Test wickets. Shami will have a chance to write his name in the history books yet again in the Third Test match versus South Africa in Newlands, Cape Town. The 31-year-old needs to pick up five more wickets to join the likes of Anil Kumble, Javagal Srinath, Harbhajan Singh, and Ravichandran Ashwin in an elite list of bowlers. Mohammed Shami has so far amassed 45 Test wickets against South Africa in 20 appearances and will need five more wickets to surpass the figure of 50 Test wickets against the Proteas. The Indian speedster will thus be able to join the legendary bowlers like Anil Kumble, Javagal Srinath etc on an elusive list.

WASIM JAFFER FEELS THIS PLAYER SHOULD'VE LED INDIA IN VIRAT KOHLI'S ABSENCE INSTEAD OF KL RAHUL

Former Indian opener Wasim Jaffer, renowned for his hilarious memes on social media, opined that he was 'surprised' to see KL Rahul walking out to captain team India in the second Test versus South Africa. Rahul was handed the captaincy after Virat Kohli suffered an upper back spasm and was subsequently ruled out of the second Test. Jaffer though felt that the management made the wrong choice, as instead of KL Rahul they've should let Ajinkya Rahane captain the team, owing to his unbeaten record as the skipper in the purest format. Speaking to InsideSport, Jaffer said, "I was surprised by the management's decision. When you have someone as good as Ajinkya Rahane available who has not lost any Test as a captain and won you a Test series in Australia, do you need to give the Test captaincy to KL Rahul?" 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CLOSE-IN: CRICKET TEST CAPTAINCY IS A DYING ART

Captaining ones country side is an honour that every cricketer dreams of. The injuries to Virat Kohli and earlier to Rohit Sharma have given KL Rahul the golden moment to become one. He became the 36th Indian Test captain and his name has now been etched in the history of Indian cricket, forever. In the elite list of Indian captains, there are many who have had a short stint, some have been successful and some not. The pressure of leading ones country is enormous. As much as one may say that the captain is as good as his team, the onus and responsibility solely seems to fall, especially in defeat, on the one who is the leader. In the earlier days, when the coach was just looked at as a manager and the captain controlled every cricketing aspect of the game, captaincy was another ball game.

The final playing eleven, the batting order and even the field placement was the domain of the one at the helm. There were some extraordinary leaders who in the days of no video analysis could detect weaknesses and plan strategies on the spot. This was then a mandatory requirement of a captain as every other member of the side looked up to them.

Captaining a side in the present days has become a completely different kettle of fish. The captains, from several recent press reports, seem to indicate that they have very little say in choosing the touring side. Apart from that, a captain has a professional coach and a team of support staff, each a specialist in their domain to listen to. The plans and strategies are now worked out more in the conference rooms rather than on the playing field. One truly feels sorry for the modern-day captain whose main importance seems to come from the off-the-field commercial activities.

One wonders as to how the likes of Tiger Pataudi, Chandu Borde, AjitWadekar, Bishan Bedi, S. Venkataraghavan, Sunil Gavaskar and many such brilliant Indian cricket captains would have stood up to the way a modern captain is perceived. All of them had an astute cricket mind and were ready to discuss and debate. However, once on the field they were the whole and sole of every movement that took place there. Leadership

cannot be assessed by how many matches one has won or lost or led. One needs to asses every parameter of a side to understand it. Believe me, it is not a simple case of addition or subtraction. Watching Test cricket captaincy in the present times seems like a standard pattern being followed. There is very little thought process and innovation that one comes across. Most of the teams come to the field with a concrete plan, which when it goes awry, completely disintegrates. The captain looks as much at sea as the players around him.

The present digital and multimedia influences and intensive analysis by one and all has made the captains' job unpardonable in defeat and so, rather than thinking out of the box, one becomes defensive in ones' approach. The most effective influence that has brought the downfall in the art of Test cricket captaincy has been the advent of limited-overs cricket. One does not have to take 20 wickets to win a match. The bowling and field restrictions has initiated a standard format of how to captain a side. In the limited-overs version, one does not need to plan a downfall of a batsman but restrict one in every respect. The result of this has impacted Test cricket immensely. The short format of the game may be of great interest to millions who want excitement and a definite result. One understands this in the fast-moving world that we all live in at present. However, the skill and art of patiently demolishing a bowling attack or getting a batsman out needs time. This is where captains in the modern times are failing, as batters need to be thought out and bowlers need to be used vigorously, to get teams out. This new concept of giving bowlers a fourover spell or batters the luxury of playing in their own way is quite ridiculous. When one went into the field as a captain, the only thought process was to get the opponents out as quickly as possible. One never thought of preserving bowlers for later or for the next match or series. In the late 70s and 80s, Kapil Dev was India's only destructive fast bowler. The team depended on him in foreign conditions to get wickets. He bowled his heart out whenever called for and when on a song, to get the ball out of his hand, was impossible even though it led to his exhaustion.

But, last week, it emerged that six Bengal players and their assistant coach had tested positive for COVID-19. Mumbai all-rounder Shivam Dube and the team's video analyst had also tested positive prior to the team's departure for Kolkata, to add further doubt on the tournament's immediate future and ultimately it was postponed, keeping in mind the safety of the players, support staff, match officials, and other participants involved.

What may seem a fair call given that there are 38 teams that take part in the Ranji Trophy and creating a bio-security bubble for almost two months and other logistical issues would have been a nightmare for BCCI, the grind of domestic cricketers continues.

Remember, not every player has a job in some government organisation, an IPL contract, or a supportive parent or spouse to help them see through the lean financial phase. Domestic cricket is their bread and butter and the cruel pandemic has snatched that right from them as well.

Yes, the Indian cricket board had earlier announced a significant increase in match fees for domestic players regarding their payments for 2021/22. But the financial uncertainty brought by the pandemic once again reminds about the lack of central contracts for players as well as stakeholders in the game.

Notably, the BCCI offers annual contracts to national team players who are graded on the basis of their performance over a 12-month period. The need of the hour is to do the same for domestic cricketers, umpires and others and it will be a challenging task. But if any cricket board in the world can do it, then it's the BCCI -- the richest cricket board. Even BCCI president Sourav Ganguly at the time of starting his tenure had suggested that a 'contract system' will be formulated for India's first-class

"We will bring in a contract system for first-class cricketers. We (officebearers) will ask the new finance (sub) committee to prepare a contract system," Ganguly had said.

The postponement of the Ranji Trophy has put the premier first-class tournament in a tricky situation because its final was scheduled for March 16 to 20 and the IPL usually starts by the first week of April. Postponing the Ranji Trophy by 15 or 20 days could further cripple the first-class tournament, whenever it takes off as there is already a significant reduction in the number of matches.

In 2019/20, for example, each side played eight group matches in the Ranji Trophy followed by three knockout games (if they made the final). This time around, teams will play just five group matches, which also reduces the net increase in pay.

And it is not only about the financial sufferings, the players are also missing on showcasing their talent as well. More often IPL scouts keep a close eye on these domestic matches, call players for trials and, if they get impressed, cricketers get hefty deals in auction of the cash-rich league.

Last week, the board had also postponed the Under-16 Vijay Merchant Trophy following the fresh surge of COVID-19 cases and the growing threat of the Omicron variant. COVID-19 cases have been multiplying in India in recent weeks with several states announcing night, and weekend curfews, amid other forms of restrictions and these are definitely not a good sign for Indian domestic cricket.





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
