INDIA UPSET AFTER PM TRUDEAU ISSUES STATEMENT ON FARMERS PROTEST

ndia strongly reacted to comments by Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau and other leaders there regarding farmers" protest, calling the remarks as "ill-informed" and "unwarranted" as the matter pertained to the internal affairs of a democratic country.

"We have seen some ill-informed comments by Canadian leaders relating to farmers in India. Such comments are unwarranted, especially when pertaining to the internal affairs of a democratic country," External Affairs Ministry Spokesperson Anurag Srivastava said. In a terse message, the ministry further added that "it is also best that

diplomatic conversations are not misrepresented for political purposes."

Pm Trudeau has recently made comments on farmers protests in India said, "the situation is concerning and we are all very worried about family and friends and I know that is a reality for many of you. Let me remind you, Canada will always be there to defend the right of peaceful protest."

He also said, "we believe in importance of dialogue and that is why we have reached out through multiple means directly to Indian authorities to highlight our concerns."

In an exclusive interview with Y media Canada's federal minister for Families, Children and Social Development Ahmed hussen made the following statement. Y media's group editor Yudhvir Jaswal asked -: Recently, we have all seen farmers protests in India are concerning. Prime Minister Justin Trudeau and other leaders also mentioned this. But India is quite upset and said they do welcome diplomatic channels, but the Canadian leaders' comments are for political gains. What



is your stance on this?

To which Minister Ahmed Hussen said It is not for political reasons. We continue to follow the ongoing farmers' protests in India closely. We always stand up for democratic rights, including the right to peaceful and productive assembly. We encourage peaceful and constructive dialogue on sensitive issues, and we have healthy people to people ties and diplomatic relations with India. It's a fellow democracy with Canada. But at the same time, we want to make sure that people's rights to protest peacefully are respected.

The woman claimed that Babar got her pregnant and threatened her. The video of the woman addressing a press conference was shared by journalist Saj Sadiq. "He promised to marry me, he got me pregnant, he beat me up, he threatened me and he used me," the woman was quoted as saying. "I have known Babar since the time he had nothing to do with cricket. He was from a poor household. I hope all my brothers and sisters here are going to help me get justice so that no daughter gets to go through what I have. Babar and I have grown up in the same colony, we used to stay together." The woman further stated that she and Babar have known each other from their school days and it was in 2010 that he proposed to her "He was my school friend. In 2010, he proposed to me and I accepted his proposal. He in fact proposed to me after coming to my house. As time progressed, our understanding got better. We had planned to get married and informed our families too but they refused," she added.

"Then Babar and I decided to have a court marriage. In 2011, Babar and I eloped and having promised me of marriage, kept me at rented places. During that time, I kept asking him to get married but he said 'we are not in a position to. With time, we will get married'." It was further revealed that the woman used to take care of all their expenses, including the money Babar needed for his cricket. However, in 2016 when the lady got pregnant is when she sensed a huge change in the cricketer's attitude. The PCB is yet to respond to these claims. Babar and the rest of the Pakistan team are currently in New Zealand, undergoing a 14-day quarantine period in Christchurch. Seven members of the team have tested positive for Covid-19 and have been moved to a separate floor

To mark the end of Diabetes Awareness Month, Sonia Sidhu, the Member of Parliament for Brampton South, on behalf of the Honourable Patty Hajdu, Minister of Health, announced an investment of \$6 million through the CIHR-JDRF Partnership to Defeat Diabetes for two Canadian research teams to accelerate the development of stem cell-based therapies for the treatment of T1D.

The two teams will build on Canada's demonstrated research excellence and leadership in clinical islet transplantation, stem cell biology, diabetes, immunology and genetic engineering to accelerate stem cell-based therapies for T1D. Teams will work in collaboration with other Canadian researchers to tackle some of the biggest scientific challenges that impede our progress in this area and move us closer to a future where people with T1D will no longer rely on insulin therapy.

Stem cells show great promise as a source of insulin-producing cells that could be transplanted to provide a new source of insulin, to replace dysfunctional, damaged or lost pancreatic beta cells. Canada has a remarkable legacy in leading discoveries in this area.

Stem cells were discovered in Toronto in 1961, and in 2000, a team in Edmonton were the first to pioneer transplantation of pancreatic islets (the part of the pancreas that contains insulin-producing cells). These achievements represent important steps toward a treatment that will allow people with T1D to live healthy lives without daily insulin injections.



BIDEN ADMINISTRATION MIGHT BE RISKY FOR CHINESE ECONOMY, HERE'S WHY

CHINA MUST DROP ITS ILLUSION THAT ITS RELATIONS WITH THE UNITED STATES WILL AUTOMATICALLY IMPROVE UNDER US PRESIDENT-ELECT JOE BIDEN'S ADMINISTRATION.



As tensions between the US and China continue to worsen under the very likely [that Trump will run again], he is still very healthy," Li said. current President Donald Trump's administration due to Beijing's human rights violations and hiding vital information regarding COVID-19, a leading economist said that the incoming Biden administration might impose sanctions thus affecting the Chinese economy next year. David Li Daokui, a professor at Tsinghua University and a former adviser to China's central bank, according to South China Morning Post warned that economic planners should not rule out the possibility of a Trump comeback in 2024 and added that President-elect Biden might "continue Trump's hard-line approach to China."

"If you ask me what are the risks facing the Chinese economy next year ... Number one, will Biden introduce restrictive policies that are precisely targeted at certain China's industries? That remains a question mark," he said at the China Macroeconomy Forum.

He added, "Next year, China's foreign policy, certain industries and certain companies are likely to face some risks."

The economist claimed that it would be much easier to communicate with Biden's team than Trump's administration. However, he said that

China must drop its illusion that its relations with the United States will automatically improve under President-elect Joe Biden's administration, a Chinese government advisor has said, adding that Beijing should be prepared for a tough stance from Washington.

Zheng Yongnian, the Dean of the Advanced Institute of Global and Contemporary China Studies, a Shenzhen-based think tank, has said that the Chinese government should utilise every opportunity to mend ties with the US, South China Morning Post has reported.

"The good old days are over... the cold war hawks in the US have been in a highly mobilised state for several years, and they will not disappear overnight," Zheng said in an interview on the sidelines of the Understanding China Conference in Guangzhou recently.

Biden pledged that he would force China "to play by the international rules" regarding trade, treatment of foreign companies, and its actions in the South China Sea if he is elected to office. "We need to be having the rest of our friends with us saying to China: these are the rules. You play by them or you're going to pay the price for not playing China should still be prepared for a Trump comeback in 2024. "It is by them, economically," said Biden during a Presidential debate.

UK APPROVES PFIZER-BIONTECH COVID-19 VACCINE, ROLLOUT 'NEXT WEEK'

vaccine, with its regulator clearing Pfizer Inc. and BioNTech SE's shot ahead of decisions in the US and European Union. The emergency authorization clears the way for the deployment of a vaccine that's expected to play a significant role in the global effort to halt the coronavirus. Pfizer and its German partner said in November that the shot, relying on novel technology called messenger RNA, was 95% effective in a final analysis of clinical-trial data. The vaccine will be available in Britain from next week, according to a government statement. The U.K. regulator, the Medicines and Healthcare Products Regulatory Agency, said on Wednesday that the vaccine "met its strict standards of safety, quality and effectiveness."

The U.K. had signaled it would move swiftly in approving a vaccine to protect its population, and doctors across the country were put on standby for a possible rollout. For the government, it's an opportunity to make up for missteps during the pandemic as Britain's death toll nears 60,000. Regulators are facing pivotal decisions as companies including Pfizer, Moderna Inc. and the University of Oxford's partner, AstraZeneca Plc, sprint ahead in a bid to deliver coronavirus vaccines in record time.



China 'planned' Galwan Valley clash, US commission says in report to Congress

The Chinese government had planned the clash with Indian troops in Galwan Valley in June, which resulted in the death of 20 Indian soldiers and unspecified Chinese casualties, a US commission has concluded in a new report to Congress.

The US-China Economic and Security Review Commission, in the report submitted on December 1, described the nearly eight-monthlong India-China standoff along the Line of Actual Control (LAC) as the "most severe border crisis in decades".

Referring to the "massive physical brawl in the Galwan Valley" between People's Liberation Army (PLA) and Indian troops on June 15, the report said, "Some evidence suggested the Chinese government had planned the incident, potentially including the possibility for fatalities. For instance, several weeks prior to the clash, Defense Minister Wei [Fenghe] made his statement encouraging Beijing to 'use fighting to promote stability'." It added, "Satellite images depicted a large Chinese buildup in the Galwan Valley, including potentially 1,000 PLA soldiers, the week before the deadly skirmish." The report further noted that just "over two weeks before the incident, in another potential indication of Chinese leaders signalling their intent to escalate tensions, an editorial in China's stateowned tabloid Global Times warned that India would suffer a 'devastating blow' to its trade and economic ties with China if it got 'involved in the US-China rivalry'". The India-China border standoff emerged in the open after two clashes between troops of the two

sides in the Sikkim and Ladakh sectors of the LAC. The two countries have been unable to agree on disengagement and de-escalation at friction points despite several rounds of diplomatic and military talks.

Donald Trump's H-1B visa rule that hurt Indians scrapped by US judge

A US judge on Tuesday threw out two rules proposed by the Trump administration to narrow eligibility for H-1B visa aspirants and raise their salaries in an effort to make it tougher for companies, mostly in IT, to use this short-term employment programme to hire foreigner workers instead of local Americans.

US district judge Jeffrey S. White of the Northern District of California ruled that the changes were introduced in a hurry and did not abide

by the usual transparency obligations: provide notice and sufficient time for public comments.

The administration had sought to rush it through in October arguing urgency - as a "good cause exception" - in view of the Covid-19 pandemic. "The court cannot countenance - reluctantly or otherwise - defendants' reliance on the Covid-19 pandemic to invoke the good-cause exception," White wrote. "The pandemic's impact on the economy is the only reason DHS proffered as good cause, and defendants do not dispute that the failure to provide notice and comment was prejudicial." The United States issues 85,000 new H-1B visa every year. More than 70% of them go to Indian professionals hired by American companies such as Facebook, Google and Microsoft, and Indian IT services companies such as TCS, Wipro and Infosys. Many of them tend to stay on and graduate to permanent residency, or Green Cards, and eventually citizenship - such as Alphabet CEO Sundar Pichai, who came to the US to study on an F-1 visa, got hired by McKinsey on H-1B and went on to become a US citizen via the mandatory Green Card. "This ruling has many companies across various industries breathing a huge sigh of relief today," said Jon Baselice, director of immigration policy for the US Chamber of Commerce in a statement. "Both of these rules had the potential to be incredibly disruptive to the operations of many businesses."

RUSSIA'S SPUTNIK V COVID-19 VACCINE TO COST LESS THAN RS 740 PER DOSE IN GLOBAL MARKETS



Russia's Sputnik V COVID-19 vaccine will cost less than Rs 1,480 (USD 20) per person on international markets and will be free of charge for Russian citizens, according to a statement on the official Sputnik V Twitter account.

The Sputnik vaccine is administered in two shots, each of which will cost less than Rs 740 (USD 10) each, according to the official Sputnik V Twitter account.

Meanwhile, Moscow has aimed to produce more than a billion doses of Sputnik V at home and abroad next year, its backers and developers said on Tuesday.

Kirill Dmitriev, head of Russia's RDIF sovereign wealth fund, said Moscow and its foreign partners have capacity to make more than a billion doses starting from next year, enough to vaccinate over 500 million people.

The pricing announcement comes as Russia looks to scale up distribution and production.

Price of other coronavirus vaccines

The international market price for Sputnik V unveiled on Tuesday is cheaper than some other Western rivals such as a vaccine produced by Pfizer-BioNTech, which costs 15.5 euros per shot, but more expensive that a vaccine produced by AstraZeneca which will be sold in Europe for around 2.5 euros per shot.

Sputnik V 95% effective

RDIF and the Gamaleya National Center said earlier on Tuesday that new clinical trial data based on 39 confirmed cases and 18,794 patients who got both shots had shown that Sputnik V was 91.4% effective on day 28 and over 95% effective on day 42.

Moscow has been criticised by some scientists in the West who have accused it of cutting corners in an effort to try to rush out the vaccine. Russia has denied that, alleging a Western dirty tricks campaign to put people off its vaccine in what it believes has become a battle for legitimacy and market share.

As 'Dilli Chalo' protests enter day 7, Rahul Gandhi fires 'suit-boot' jibe at Centre



Congress leader Rahul Gandhi, who has been vehemently criticising the central government over the three contentious farm laws passed by it in September, on Wednesday once again fired a 'suit-boot' jibe at it as the 'Dilli Chalo' protests against the legislations entered day seven.

"What the government said: farmers' income will be doubled. What the government did: increased income of its cronies four times and will halve farmers' income. This is a government of lies and a 'suit-boot' government," Gandhi tweeted on Wednesday.

In the last few days, Gandhi has been vocal on the anti-farm law protests which have only intensified despite government's efforts to stop them. "While the country's food providers are protesting on the roads, the liars are giving speeches on national television. Farmers' hard work is a debt on all of us. This debt can only be paid back by giving them justice and not by lathi-charging them or firing tear gas at them. Wake up, put your ego aside and give the farmer what he deserves," he had tweeted on Tuesday.

Farmers, majority of whom are from Punjab - a state where Gandhi's Congress is in power - have been protesting, against what they call "black laws," since these were passed. Initially, they blocked railway tracks in Punjab and later announced the 'Dilli Chalo' march towards Delhi. They began their march on November 26 and reached Delhi, despite attempts by the Haryana police to stop them. While a section of farmers is protesting at the capital's Nirankari grounds in Burari, majority are camping at various borders of the city and have vowed not to leave till the laws are taken back. A meeting between the government and farm union leaders on Tuesday was inconclusive. The farm leaders rejected the government's proposal to set up a panel to discuss the laws and said that the protests will continue. The next round of talks between the two sides will take place on Thursday.

COVID-19 Lockdown – Week 1 Enforcement Includes Thousands of Inspections

Mississauga, as part of Peel Region, has been in the Grey-Lockdown zone of the Government of Ontario's Keeping Ontario Safe and Open Framework for one week. In that week, there have been enhancements as to how the City's Enforcement Division has approached the new regulations. "We launched an ambitious proactive inspection plan designed to get ahead of violations and correct behaviours quickly and purposefully," said Sam Rogers, Director of Enforcement for the City of Mississauga. "Enforcement Officers were re-assigned from their regular duties to double our 'boots on the ground' and conduct thousands of inspections."

Rogers added that public complaints have tripled in the past week and 4,500 inspections were conducted in the first seven days of the lockdown which resulted in 57 charges and 51 notices of contravention. "Violations were observed across all sectors including house parties, gyms, retail stores, car dealerships, pet retail, salons, furniture stores, restaurants and electronics stores," noted Rogers. "The vast majority of people and businesses are complying but there are some out there who are intentionally breaking the rules and putting lives at risk." "I want to thank the vast majority of residents and businesses who are complying with the lockdown restrictions," said Mayor Bonnie Crombie, "These enhanced enforcement measures will allow us to better identify those who are not in compliance with the regulations and penalize those who flagrantly flout the rules. Everyone has a part to play in limiting the spread of this virus."

age, or social background." (Deep Kaur)



WE ARE PLANNING FOR LIFE AFTER COVID, TO MAKE SURE THAT WE BUILD BACK BETTER: MINISTER HUSSEN

So much has happened in Canada and worldwide in the past months- COVID-19, economic changes, protests, and many more. Ahmed Hussen, Minister of Families, Children and Social Development, presented his viewpoints on varied topics like Liberals' fall economic report, COVID -19 vaccine procurement and even ongoing farmers' protest in India. He discussed his opinions with Y Media's Group Editor, YudhvirJaswal, who touched on these different issues. Read on.

YudhvirJaswal: We did hear an ambitious plan by PM Trudeau government for a \$100 billion recovery plan. Could you give us some details on that?

Minister Ahmed Hussen: "We want to build a more resilient economy. We are still not

out of the woods with respect to the second wave of the COVID-19 pandemic. But we also are planning for life after COVID, to make sure that we build back better. We have a targeted stimulus plan of up to three to four per cent of GDP and would be spending that as a stimulus plan over three years to foster strong economic growth. We want to make sure that we provide up to 700,000 grants to homeowners to help them make their homes' energy efficient. We want to make sure that we put the foundational pieces in place to create a Canada-wide early learning and childcare system. We are spending and investing \$420 million to ensure that we recruit and retain early learning and childcare workers. We want to make sure that we are growing in a way that protects our environment and grows our economy. And in the months ahead, we will develop a stimulus plan to make our economy more resilient and certainly more competitive. We will extend the Canada emergency wage subsidy to summer next year and make sure that we increase the maximum wage subsidy rate to 75 per cent for the period beginning in December until March 13. That is because we recognize that businesses are under increasing pressure. The Canada emergency business account will also be expanded, and we will allow more qualifying businesses to get interest-free \$20,000 loan where they needed. We are extending the supports to workers, the employment insurance supports, and Canada covered benefits. We will keep those until the fall of next year. The



Canada emergency business account itself has helped over 790,000 small businesses. So we want to make sure that Canadian businesses are taken care of because they will be better positioned to bounce back better. We are providing a little bit more support to families with a payment of \$1,200 for children under six in the year 2021."

YudhvirJaswal: Could you please elaborate on the \$20 million funding that will be spent in the next five years for national childcare, and is there any other support provided by the government?

Minister Ahmed Hussen: "Actually, that is misinformation. \$20 million is to establish a federal early learning and childcare secretary. But in addition to that, we will be spending \$420 million to help retain

and attract early childhood educators. We promise to set up a national system of early learning and childcare, but you need the workers to educate the children. To put those foundational pieces in there, we are hiring and retaining the educators to build the system. We are also increasing the first time the amount eligible under the first-time homebuyer incentive. We introduced the first time home buyer incentive for a maximum eligible amount of \$500,000 to purchase a home, and the Government of Canada would help first time homebuyer by contributing 10 per cent as a down-payment. For example, if somebody is buying a home for \$500,000, the Government of Canada would give them \$50,000 support in the form of a down-payment. So we're introducing changes to the first-time homebuyer incentive to reflect the actual financial realities of those living in GTA, the Greater Vancouver area and Victoria. So that was also in the fall economic statement."

YudhvirJaswal: There has not been any starting line mentioned by the PM related to vaccine acquirement, and the opposition is questioning that. Do you have anything to comment on this?

Minister Ahmed Hussen: "Well, Canada is in the best position. We have contracted and obtained the rights to the largest amount of doses of any country in the world, over 400 million doses. That works out to more than ten doses for each Canadian. We have hedged our bets by putting those contracts and entering into contracts with seven of the most promising

vaccines; four of those vaccine candidates are now undergoing Health Canada's regulatory approval. As soon as they're approved. Canadians will be ahead in the line because we've already secured the doses. So I don't know what the conservatives are talking about in saying we're in the back end of the line: we're not. We're in the front of the line, and you don't have to own, only listen to our government to believe that. Listen to the CEO of Moderna, one of the manufacturers of vaccines, who said that Canada is at the head of the line, and Canada has the right to receive the doses once they approve. Both industry and our government say that, so I don't know where the consumers are getting this false information. It is very unfortunate."

YudhvirJaswal: Could you please throw light on the number of vaccines we might be getting in the first quarter of 2021? Minister Ahmed Hussen: Regarding the amount, I can tell we have secured over 400 million vaccine doses of promising vaccine candidates. That is the highest secured number of possible doses by any country in the world. No other government has obtained the contractual rights and paid money to secure that many vaccines. No, no other country has done that. Second, because we have secured those vaccines, we must make sure that we get them as soon as they become available. Now, I cannot answer specific timelines because they are undergoing Health Canada's approval. And that process takes some time. They are trying to fast track it as much as possible because of the need. But as soon as any of those four become viable, we will start to deploy and distribute those vaccines. And I know that provinces like Ontario also have their plans for distribution. So, we are ready to go. We will deploy all resources to make sure that we vaccinate as many Canadians as possible.

YudhvirJaswal: Recently, we have all seen farmers' protests in India are concerning. Prime Minister Justin Trudeau and other leaders also mentioned this. But India is quite upset and said they do welcome diplomatic channels, but the Canadian leaders' comments are for political gains. What is your stance on this?

Minister Ahmed Hussen: It is not for political reasons. We continue to follow the ongoing farmers' protests in India closely. We always stand up for democratic rights, including the right to peaceful and productive assembly. We encourage peaceful and constructive dialogue on sensitive issues, and we have healthy people to people ties and diplomatic relations with India. It's a fellow democracy with Canada. But at the same time, we want to make sure that people's rights to protest peacefully are respected.

FEDERAL GOVERNMENT PLANS \$100 **BILLION IN ECONOMIC STIMULUS**

"We have a plan to get through the winter, we have a plan to provide vaccines to Canadians, and we have a plan to build our economy back." The Liberal government plans to spend up to \$100 billion to boost the post-pandemic economy. The short-term stimulus program is estimated at \$70 billion to \$100 billion over roughly three years.

Ahmed Hussen, Minister of Families, Children and Social Development, said in an exclusive interview with Y media, the government is "also planning for the life after COVID-19 to make sure it (government) builds a

"We want to build a more resilient economy. We are still not out of the woods concerning the second wave of the COVID-19 pandemic. We have a targeted stimulus plan of up to three to four per cent of GDP to foster strong economic growth." he said.

The government says the stimulus spending anticipates building a more inclusive, more innovative, greener, and competitive economy that will launch after vaccine distribution and life begins to return to normal.

"When the virus is under control, and our economy is ready for new growth, we will deploy an ambitious stimulus package to jump-start our recovery," Freeland said in a statement read in the House of Commons. Freeland said the stimulus program would help guard against long-term damage to the economy. She said government debt is highly affordable now due to Canada's strong past economic performance and low-inter-

The finance department gives four scenarios for utilizing the money starting in fiscal 2021-22 but did not include that money in its current fiscal

"Make no mistake: We commit to providing fiscal support until the economy is firmly back on track," the government said.

Part of the stimulus includes providing a \$20 million "down payment" to fund the design and implementation of a national childcare program and providing more direct supports for low- and middle-income families with young children this year.

"We will be spending \$420 million (\$20 million being part of it) to help retain and attract early childhood educators. We promise to set up a national system of early learning and childcare, but we need the workers to educate the children, Hussen said. (unsure about the figures, though!) Canada also plans to spend more than \$3 billion over ten years to plant two billion trees and \$2.6 billion over seven years to help people make their homes more energy-efficient.

Minister Ahmed Hussen also said the government intends to provide up to 700,000 grants to homeowners to help them make their homes' energy efficient.

The financial statement extends help to struggling students by promising to reduce debt and eliminating interest on the federal portion of Canada student loans and Canada apprentice loans for the next fiscal year.

OPPOSITION VIEWS

Conservative Leader Erin O'Toole called the fall economic statement a "stealth budget" and blamed the government for "burning money to hide its incompetence."

O'Toole said there could be no plan for rebuilding the economy until there is a solid plan to procure vaccines, thereby calling the government's response to the pandemic as "erratic and confused."

"Our government had the duty to learn from its errors in the first wave, but

time as our allies," he said.

NDP Leader Jagmeet Singh said the Liberal plan helps those who are profiting during the pandemic and fails those who need help the most, including smaller businesses.

"We see a Liberal government that is not willing to ask the wealthiest to pay their fair share. They have not really taken any concrete steps to look at revenue sources from the pandemic profiteers, the excess profits made during this pandemic, nor a tax on wealth," Singh said.

LIBERALS' AIM

Prime Minister Justin Trudeau says that the Liberal approach to lifting the country out of the COVID-19 economic recession will not be achieved through cuts.

"We all remember what happened when the previous government cut support too quickly during the 2008-2009 recession. That will not be our approach," Trudeau said during his Rideau Cottage address.

"This (fall economic report) will be a significant investment to get our economy back on track, and it's an investment that will make sure no one gets left behind. We need to address the very real gaps this crisis has laid bare... Because we are all the better off when everyone can contribute to their full potential," Trudeau said.

Delhi-Noida border closed due to farmers' protest

Farmers protesting against Centre's farm laws continued their sit-in at the Noida-Delhi border for the second day on Wednesday, leading to closure of a key route that connects Uttar Pradesh with the national capital. The Delhi Traffic Police has advised commuters travelling to the national capital to avoid using the Chilla route and instead take the Delhi-Noida Direct (DND) or Kalindi Kunj road.

"The Chilla border on Noida-link road is closed for traffic due to farmers protests near Gautam Budh Dwar. People are advised to avoid Noida-link road for going to Noida and use NH-24 and DND instead for Noida," Delhi Traffic Police tweeted.

Hundreds of farmers affiliated to the Bharatiya Kisan Union (BKU) and other groups had gathered at UP border on Tuesday evening. Heavy security was deployed to prevent them from proceeding towards Delhi to join farmers of Punjab and Haryana in their protest.

Farmers are protesting against the three agricultural laws passed by were being faced by farmers in a short span of time," he added.

KEJRIWAL CLAIMS AMARINDER 'HAD SEVERAL CHANCES TO STOP FARM BILLS, BUT DID NOT DO SO'

NEW DELHI: Delhi Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal on Wednesday claimed that the BJP-ruled Centre was angry with him for not permitting stadiums to be used as temporary jails for farmers protesting against the farm laws.

In a press briefing, Kejriwal also hit out at Punjab Chief Minister Amarinder Singh saying that he was speaking "BJP's language" by accusing him of "passing" three farm laws in Delhi.

Last week, the AAP government had denied permission to the Delhi Police to convert the city's stadiums into temporary jails. "The BJP-ruled Centre is angry with me for this," the Delhi chief minister said.

He also accused the Punjab CM of doing "dirty politics" and levelling false allegations on him.

"Captain saheb you are levelling allegations against me and speaking BJP's language. Is it the pressure of ED cases on your family members and the notices being sent?" Kejriwal asked.

The three farm laws were implemented across the country with the signature of the president and no state can stop them, he said about the three farm laws being stiffly opposed by farmers.

The Delhi government has notified one of the three laws.

"The Punjab CM accused me of passing the three black laws. How can he do such lowly politics at such a crucial time," Kejriwal



said. "Amarinder Singh had several chances to stop farm bills but did not do so," he added. Kejriwal appealed to the Centre to immediately fulfil all the demands of the farmers and guarantee the minimum support price for their crops.

RHEA CHAKRABORTY'S BROTHER **SHOWIK GETS BAIL**



MUMBAI: A Mumbai court on Wednesday granted bail to actress Rhea Chakraborty's brother Showik Chakraborty, who was arrested in a drugs case linked to actor Sushant Singh Rajput's death.

The Narcotics Control Bureau (NCB) had arrested Showik Chakraborty in September this year under provisions of the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances (NDPS) Act. Special NDPS court judge G B Gurao granted bail to him on Wednesday on a personal bond of Rs 50,000.

In his bail plea, Showik Chakraborty had relied on a recent Supreme Court judgment which said that "confessional statements" made to NCB officials cannot be considered as evidence. He reiterated that he has been "falsely implicated" in the case.

Earlier, the court had also granted him bail in a related case. The NCB alleged said that Rhea Chakraborty, who was Sushant Singh Rajput's girlfriend, and her brother used to facilitate drug deliveries and payment through credit cards, cash and other payment gateways.

The agency is conducting a probe into various drug angles linked to death of Rajput, who was found hanging at his residence in suburban Bandra on June 14 this year.

The NCB its investigation after the Enforcement Directorate (ED), which was probing money laundering charges linked to the case, shared some social media chats retrieved from Rhea Chakraborty's mobile phone, hinting at the alleged use of banned drugs. The central agency had earlier also arrested Rhea Chakraborty and some staff members of Rajput and a few others under various sections of the NDPS Act. Rhea Chakraborty and some other accused are currently out on bail.

WILL TAKE FIRST SHOT OF COVID VACCINE IN PUNJAB: AMARINDER

CHANDIGARH: With the Covid vaccine in the final stages of operationalisation in India, Chief Minister Captain Amarinder on Wednesday announced that he would take the first shot of the vaccine in Punjab, once it is cleared by the Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR).

The Chief Minister made the announcement at the virtual Cabinet meeting, during a presentation to discuss the Covid situation in Punjab and the state's preparedness to roll out the vaccine. In line with the Government of India strategy for vaccination, Punjab has prioritised healthcare workers, frontline workers, the elderly population (over 50 years of age), and people with co-morbidities (< or = 50 years), the meeting was informed. According to Punjab Health Secretary Hussan Lal, the state has compiled data of 1.25 lakh government and private healthcare workers to be vaccinated in the first phase. Approximately 23 per cent (70 lakh) of the state's population - estimated at around 3 crore will be vaccinated in terms of the Centre's guidelines on vaccine prioritisation, Lal added.

Defer all engagements to solve farmers' problems: SAD to PM Modi

CHANDIGARH: The Shiromani Akali Dal (SAD) on Saturday asked Prime Minister Narendra Modi to "put all other engagements on hold and personally address and resolve the genuine demands of the agitating annadata of the country as a top national priority".

"The agitators' demands on the three anti-farmer Acts are perfectly legitimate, secular and constitutional," said the party. "The Prime Minister and his colleagues have repeatedly maintained that the assured marketing of farmers' produce at minimum support price will be continued under all circumstances. That being so, there should be no objection to nor any problem in giving a legal shape to the government's commitments through necessary legislation."

The core committee of the party which met here this afternoon, also came down heavily against the Haryana Chief Minister Manohar Lal Khattar for his "highly provocative, dangerous and divisive statement" dubbing the farmers as "Khalistanis". "Do these beleaguered elderly men and ladies from farmers' families look like Khalistanis to Khattar and his party? It is not the farmers but the Haryana CM himself who is guilty of flouting the Constitution of the country on the anniversary of the Adoption Day of the Statute," the party said in a statement.

The party also accused the Haryana CM of trying to revive the old Congress tactics to paint its political opponents as separatists. "It is the same mindset that was responsible for the Congress repression against Akali agitators in 1982 and continued for a decade and a half, painting a fiercely patriotic community as separatist," read the SAD resolution.

DELHI WITNESSED COLDEST NOVEMBER IN LAST 71 YEARS; HERE'S THE REASON BEHIND IT



FOR THE FIRST TIME IN THE LAST 71 YEARS, DELHI RECORDED A MINIMUM TEMPERATURE OF 10.2 DEGREES CELSIUS IN NOVEMBER.

The month of November was the coldest for national capital Delhi in the last 71 years. The reason behind such severe cold in November was the absence of global factors like La Nina and Western Disturbance. Apart from this, the absence of rain in September and the lack of clouds in the sky also caused such cold weather in Delhi.

For the first time in the last 71 years, Delhi recorded a minimum temperature of 10.2 degrees Celsius in November. It may be noted that according to the India Meteorological Department (IMD), the lowest temperature recorded in Delhi is generally around 12.9 degrees in November. Significantly, not only in the month of November 2020, but low temperatures were recorded in October also, and the cold had broken the record of the last 58 years. In October this year, the minimum temperature was recorded at 17.2 degree Celsius. Such a cold winter in October was recorded in the year 1962 when the tempera-sky is clear, it is cold.

ture was recorded at 16.9 degree Celsius.

This situation may get even worse. As per the weather department, Monday (November 30) was the coldest day of November in Delhi, when the minimum temperature dropped to 6.9 degrees Celsius.

Director-General of Indian Meteorological Department M Mahapatra says that global factors like La Nina have already made their impact felt. The weather reaches its peak when local and regional factors also contribute along with global factors. Due to this, such a cold November was seen in Delhi.

He further said that the absence of rain in the month of September also caused so much cold in Delhi in November. Due to no showers, the atmosphere was mostly dry and there was a lack of moisture, as a result, the sky was clear and there was a lack of clouds. When the

CROSS-BORDER TERRORISM FROM PAKISTAN, REFORMS AT WHO REMAIN TOP FOCUSES

India strongly raised the issue of cross-border terrorism from Pakistan and attempts to raise the bilateral issue at the Shanghai Cooperation Organization (SCO) heads of government meet.

Vice-President Venkaiah Naidu said, "The most important challenge faced by us in the region is terrorism, particularly cross-border terrorism. Terrorism is truly the enemy of humanity. It is a scourge we need to collectively combat."

Pointing at Pakistan, Naidu explained, "We remain concerned about threats emerging from ungoverned spaces and are particularly concerned about States that leverage terrorism as an instrument of state policy. Such an approach is entirely against the spirit and ideals and the Charter of the Shanghai Cooperation Organization."

This is the first time since India became a member of the SCO in 2017, that it hosted such a large meet of SCO leaders. It was expected to take place physically but took place virtually due to the COVID pandemic. The Vice-President also raised the issue of Pakistan trying to raise bilateral issues at the grouping. He said, "It is unfortunate to note that there have been attempts to deliberately bring bilateral issues into SCO and blatantly violate the well-established principles and norms of SCO Charter safeguarding the sovereignty and territorial integrity of SCO Member States."

The Pakistani NSA, earlier this year, sat in SCO virtual meet with a map of Pakistan which showed incorrect boundaries of India, irking New Delhi. In fact, Russia, which is the host of the grouping this year, also said, bilateral matters should not be raised at the body.

FARM REFORM LAWS HAVE GIVEN NEW OPPORTUNITIES TO FARMERS, SAYS PM MODI

In a bid to allay fears of farmers who have been protesting against the new farm laws, Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Sunday said that the agricultural reforms have opened the doors of new opportunities for farmers and gave them more rights.

"Recent agri-reforms have opened the doors of new opportunities for farmers. Decades-old demands of farmers which were promised by many political parties have now been met. Parliament has recently passed farm reform laws after rigorous brainstorming. These reforms have not only broken shackles of farmers but have also given new rights and opportunities to them," PM Modi said while addressing the nation in the 71st edition of his monthly radio programme 'Mann Ki Baat'. "Under this law, it is mandatory to pay farmers within three days of purchasing the produce. If payment is not made, then the farmer can lodge a complaint. Another major provision is that the SDM of the area must address the complaint of the farmer within one month," he said.

The Prime Minister requested the youth especially those studying agriculture to go to nearby villages and make farmers aware about modern farming and recent farm reforms.

"By doing this, you will become a partner in big change that is happening in the country," he said. The Prime Minister's comments came even as hundreds of farmers continue to camp in and around the national capital as part of their agitation against the Centre's agricultural laws.

In his radio broadcast, Modi touched upon various other topics ranging from the idol of goddess Annapurna, stolen in 1913 from Varanasi, being brought back to India from Canada to emphasising that educational institutions should harness the strengths and talents of their alumni. Remembering Guru Nanak Dev, whose birth anniversary is on Monday, Modi lauded his noble ideals and added that he considered himself to be for tunate for his involvement in



various works related to Sikh gurus and gurudwaras. He also hailed the opening of the Kartarpur Sahib corridor in November last year as historic. In his remarks, PM Modi talked about a gurudwara in Kutch, which is considered very sacred and special.

The culture of India is gaining popularity all over the world, he noted. "One such effort is by Jonas Masetti, who is based in Brazil and popularises Vedanta as well as the Gita among people there. He uses technology effectively to popularise our culture and ethos," Modi said. The prime minister also lauded Gaurav Sharma, the MP for Hamilton West, New Zealand, for taking his oath of office in Sanskrit. Farmers from various states have embarked on 'Dilli Chalo' march to protest against the three farm laws. Reaching out to protesting farmers, Union Home Minister Amit Shah had on Saturday said the Central government was ready to hold talks on their "every problem and demand".

He urged the farmers, who are protesting against three farm laws enacted recently, to shift to Nirankari Samagam Ground marked for their protest by Delhi Police and said the Centre was ready to talk to them earlier than December 3.

India test-fires anti-ship version of BrahMos supersonic cruise missile from Andaman Nicobar Islands



India on Tuesday test-fired the anti-ship version of the BrahMos supersonic cruise missile from the Andaman and Nicobar Islands territory, news agency ANI quoted sources as saying. The test was conducted as part of the trials being conducted by the Indian Navy, the sources added.

A land-attack version of the BrahMos supersonic cruise missile was also successfully test-fired from the Andaman and Nicobar Islands territory last week.

"The test was conducted by the Indian Army which has many regiments of the Defence Research and Development Organisation-developed Missile system. The strike range of BrahMos missile has now been enhanced to over 400 km." sources said.

The BrahMos supersonic cruise missile is the world's fastest operational system in its class. The DRDO recently extended the range of the missile system from the existing 298 km to around 450 km.

Last week, the Indian Army successfully test-fired a landattack version of the BrahMos supersonic cruise missile from the Andaman and Nicobar Islands territory, news agency ANI reported.

The supersonic cruise missile was test-fired at 10 am on November 24 and it successfully hit its target, which was on another island, the report added.

"The test was conducted by the Indian Army which has many regiments of the DRDO-developed Missile system. The strike range of BrahMos missile has now been enhanced to over 400 km," the news agency quoted sources as saying. In the last two months, DRDO has been successful in testing both new and existing missile systems including the Shaurya missile system which can hit targets at over 800 km and technology demonstration vehicles for hypersonic missile technology.

Uttarakhand government allows curfew to be imposed in 13 districts

In the wake of rising coronavirus cases, the Uttarakhand government on Monday permitted the District Magistrates (DM) of all 13 districts of the state to impose curfew (not lockdown), if necessary, in their neighbourhoods to contain the spread of the infection.

"The government has given the right to impose curfew power to District Magistrates as per the requirement in their districts for the prevention of corona, however, they are not allowed to impose lockdown," Om Prakash, Chief Secretary of Uttarakhand said on Monday while issuing the guidelines. Speaking to ANI he said, "Those coming from other states to Uttarakhand have to get registered and thermal screening of the passengers will be done at the state borders, check posts, railway stations, airports, according to the Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs).

"He said instructions have been given to the DMs that 80 percent of the people who came in contact with the corona positive person in the containment zone have to be traced within 72 hours. Moreover, the government has reduced the number of people attending cultural, social, political and religious programmes to 100 instead of 200.

Meanwhile, the Uttarakhand state capital Dehradun is observing weekly lockdown of all market places from today, with the exception of shops selling essential items. Presently, the state has 4,970 active cases of COVID-19 including 67,457 recoveries and 1,222 deaths reported in the last 24 hours, the state health department informed on Sunday.

For the uninformed, in a report, it was stated that Harshal Pradhan, a close aide of Maharashtra chief minister Uddhav Thackeray, on Sunday said that Urmila will join the party in the CM's presence. The report further stated that Urmila's name has been forwarded to governor B S Koshyari by the Shiv Sena for nomination to the Legislative Council from the governor's quota. The names of 11 others have also been forwarded by the three-party Maha Vikas Aghadi (MVA) government for their nomination from the governor's quota. Urmila had unsuccessfully contested the 2019 Lok Sabha election from the Mumbai North constituency as a Congress candidate. However, she had later quit the party over the functioning of the Mumbai unit of the Congress. The actor had recently grabbed headlines after she criticised actor Kangana Ranaut for comparing Mumbai with Pakistan-occupied Kashmir (PoK) and the nepotism issue.

JOE BIDEN EXPRESSES SENSE OF **URGENCY IN ADVANCING CLIMATE GOALS**

Joe Biden has expressed a clear sense of urgency in advancing climate goals as the US President-elect discussed his decision to rejoin the historic Paris Agreement on his first day in office during a meeting on climate policy. In the virtual meeting with national security and climate policy staff on Monday, Biden reiterated his intention to ensure climate change is a core national security priority, according to a readout issued by the Office of the President-elect.

He expressed a clear sense of urgency in advancing his climate

Biden was joined by Vice President-elect Kamala Harris during the meeting to discuss ways to meet the president-elect's wide-ranging and ambitious international climate commitments.

The discussions included his decision to rejoin the Paris Agreement on his first day in office, the readout stated.

On November 4, the Trump administration formally withdrew from the 2015 Paris Agreement on Climate Change, a decision originally announced three years ago.

The Paris accord committed the US and 187 other countries to keeping rising global temperatures below 2C above pre-industrial levels and attempting to limit them even more, to a 1.5C rise. Biden has pledged that his administration would rejoin the historic Paris Agreement on climate change. Climate change is among the top four priorities of Biden. "President-elect Biden is leading the world to address the climate emergency and leading through the power of example," said a policy paper issued by his transition.

"Biden knows how to stand with America's allies, stand up to adverclimate change -- he will go much further than that. He is working to our country," it said.

The US is the second leading producer of all carbon dioxide emissions globally, behind China.

US President Donald Trump's decision to quit the Paris accord has led to condemnation from environmentalists and expressions of regret from world leaders. According to the policy paper, Biden will ensure that — coming out of this profound public health and economic crisis, and facing the persistent climate crisis — the US is never caught flat-footed again.

"He is working to launch a national effort aimed at creating the jobs we need to build modern, sustainable infrastructure now and deliver an equitable clean energy future," it said.

Last month, Biden named former secretary of state John Kerry as climate envoy for national security. Kerry, 76, was one of the leading architects of the Paris climate agreement. Introducing Kerry to the nation for this position, Biden had said that for the first time ever, the US will have a full-time climate leader who will participate in ministerial-level meetings.

The current coronavirus crisis destroyed millions of American jobs, including hundreds of thousands in clean energy. It has exacerbated historic environmental injustices, the policy paper noted. "Biden will immediately invest in engines of sustainable job creation — new industries and re-invigorated regional economies spurred by innovation from our national labs and universities; commercialised into new and better products that can be manufactured and built by American saries, and level with any world leader about what must be done. UN WARNS THE CORONAVIRUS PANDEMIC WILL FAN 'DARKEST' SURGE IN HUMANITARIAN NEEDS IN 2021



The United Nations(UN) humanitarian office says needs for assistance have ballooned to unprecedented levels this year because of Covid-19, projecting that a staggering 235 million people will require help in 2021. This comes as a result of the coronavirus pandemic and global challenges including conflicts, forced migration and the impact of global warming.

The UN Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs, or OCHA, expects a 40% increase in the number of people in need of such assistance in 2021 compared to this year — a sign that pain, suffering and torment brought by the coronavirus outbreak and other problems could get worse even if hopes of a vaccine are rising.

OCHA made the projections in its latest annual Global Humanitarian Overview on Tuesday, saying its hopes to reach 160 million of those people in need will cost \$35 billion. That's more than twice the record \$17 billion that donors have provided for the international humanitarian response so far this year — and a target figure that is almost certain to go unmet. "The picture we're painting this year is the bleakest and darkest perspective on humanitarian needs we've ever set out, and that's because the pandemic has reaped carnage across the most fragile and vulnerable countries on the planet," said UN humanitarian chief Mark Lowcock, who heads OCHA.

"For the first time since the 1990s, extreme poverty is going to increase, life expectancy will fall, the annual death toll from HIV, tuberculosis and malaria is set to double," he said. "We fear a near doubling in the number of people facing starvation." Lowcock told a UN briefing in New York on the overview that he thinks the UN appeal will probably raise a record \$20 billion by the end of the year -- \$2 billion more than last year. But he said the gap between needs and funding is

growing and the UN is looking to "new players" coming on the scene in 2021, including US President-elect Joe Biden's new administration. The UN aims to reach about two-thirds of those in need, with the Red Cross and other humanitarian organizations trying to meet the rest, Lowcock explained.

UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres said humanitarian aid budgets are now facing dire shortfalls as the impact of the Covid-19 pandemic continues to worsen, and said extreme poverty has risen for the first time in more than a generation.

"The lives of people in every nation and corner of the world have been upended by the impact of the pandemic," he said. "Those already living on a knife's edge are being hit disproportionately hard by rising food prices, falling incomes, interrupted vaccination programs, and school closures." The overview, which is billed as one of the most comprehensive looks of the world's humanitarian needs, has put together nearly three dozen individual response plans for a total of 56 "vulnerable" countries. Lowcock said the biggest problem is in Yemen where there is danger of "a large-scale famine" now, saying a prime reason is lack of

funding from Gulf countries that were major donors in the past which has led to cuts in aid and the closing of clinics.

He said the biggest financial request is for the Syrian crisis and its spillover to neighbouring countries where millions of Syrians have fled to escape the more than nine-year conflict.

OCHA said other countries in need include Afghanistan, Congo, Haiti, Nigeria, South Sudan, Ukraine, and Venezuela. Newcomers to this year's list are Mozambique, where extremist activity has increased in the north, Pakistan and Zimbabwe.

Lowcock said it's not the pandemic, but its economic impact that's having the greatest effect on humanitarian needs.

"These all hit the poorest people in the poorest countries hardest of all," he said. "For the poorest, the hangover from the pandemic will be long and hard."

IRAN MOVES AHEAD ON BILL THAT **COULD END NUCLEAR INSPECTIONS**



Iran's parliament gave preliminary approval to draft legislation that could end inspections of its nuclear sites by early next year, a move that would further weaken the country's commitment to an already fragile nuclear deal. Inspections by international monitors would be restricted if US oil and banking sanctions aren't lifted within three month's of the bill's approval. The proposal still requires final approval by parliament and the Guardian Council that vets laws.

In accordance with the multi-party nuclear pact struck five years ago, Iran agreed to give United Nations inspectors more intrusive access to atomic sites.

The draft legislation would also revive the mothballed core of a contentious reactor and increase Iran's stockpile of uranium enriched to 20%, which could then be purified to weapons-grade material at short notice.

The legislation was first proposed in early November as a signal to the US ahead of its presidential election, but the conservative-majority parliament fast-tracked it after a top Iranian nuclear scientist was assassinated on Friday in an attack Iran blamed on Israel.

US President-elect Joe Biden has said he aims to rejoin the agreement President Donald Trump quit two years ago, provided Iran returns to the full compliance it abandoned in response to the US withdrawal.

Kim Jong Un given experimental Covid-19 vaccine by China, says US analyst



China has provided North Korean leader Kim Jong Un and his family with an experimental coronavirus vaccine, a US analyst said on Tuesday, citing two unidentified Japanese intelligence sources.

Harry Kazianis, a North Korea expert at the Center for the National Interest think tank in Washington, said the Kims and several senior North Korean officials had been vaccinated. It was unclear which company had supplied its drug candidate to the Kims and whether it had proven to be safe. he added. "Kim Jong Un and multiple other high-ranking officials within the Kim family and leadership network have been vaccinated for coronavirus within the last two to three weeks thanks to a vaccine candidate supplied by the Chinese government," Kazianis wrote in an article for online outlet 19FortyFive.

Citing US medical scientist Peter J. Hotez, he said at least three Chinese companies were developing a coronavirus vaccine, including Sinovac Biotech Ltd, CanSinoBio and Sinophram Group. Sinophram says its candidate has been used by nearly one million people in China, although none of the firms was known to have publicly launched Phase 3 clinical trials of their experimental Covid-19 drugs.


North Korea has not confirmed any coronavirus infections, but South Korea's National Intelligence Service (NIS) has said an outbreak there cannot be ruled out as the country had trade and people-to-people exchanges with China - the source of the pandemic - before shutting the border in late January. Microsoft said last month that two North Korean hacking groups had tried to break into the network of vaccine developers in multiple countries, without specifying the companies targeted. Sources told Reuters they included British drugmaker AstraZeneca.

The NIS said last week it had foiled North Korea's attempts to hack into South Korean Covid-19 vaccine makers.
